5. WORK IN PROGRESS

Research:

Coping with Disaster: Civil Engineering, Floods and Landslides in the Modernization of Japan (book length): This project explores how technical and social responses to widespread flooding/landslides in Japan changed during the transition to a modern society. Some large riparian projects were funded by baronial daimyo domains in the 17th – 19th centuries, but districts and villages bore primary responsibility.

The modern Meiji government (1868-1912) transformed local administration and taxation, re-defining the resources available to villages to address flood/landslide amelioration just as new engineering techniques entered Japan from the West. The national government only took responsibility for rivers at century's end. Throughout the 19th century and well into the 20th century, both the world and Japan saw a variety of innovations in the realm of engineering technology and materials that transformed both the opportunities and costs of public works designed to ameliorate the threat of two very common natural hazards: flooding and landslides. Niigata prefecture provides a case study of how local, prefectural and national organizations adapted to the challenges posed by natural hazards and the changing opportunities and problems associated with the importation and development of new practices in civil engineering.

While grounded in the traditional tools of the historian – careful reading of archival sources and qualitative analysis – this project also employs Geographic Information Systems technology and sources not typically exploited by historians. Digital elevation models, satellite and digital elevation/image data, aerial photographs, soil data, hazard maps, hydrological analysis and climate data will all be

employed as well. These data will permit structured comparison of environmental, socio-economic and political parameters within the region and between Niigata and other parts of Japan as they responded to common natural disasters over the century of Japan's modernization. Comparison of Niigata with other regions of Japan and other parts of the world is critical in assessing the applicability of conclusions drawn from Niigata to Japan as a whole and to modernizing nations in general. "In the Grasp of the State? Fiscal Authority in Early Modern Japan." Since my early work on daimyo control in early modern Japan a substantial interest has developed among both social science disciplines and history in the emergence of the modern fiscal order; Japan's experience answers some questions raised speculatively in this research, notably, would states have made more productive investments in the absence of war? Early modern Japan experienced more than two centuries of peace and this project, largely through analysis of data from Kaga domain, explores what transpires in fiscal regimes, taxation and spending in the absence war. In addition to drawing on my past published and unpublished work, it will explore most innovatively (with GIS) the impact of distance on tax assessments, an issue of interest to historians, geographers and political scientists. I will seek funding primarily for contracting some of the GIS work and hiring an assistant in statistical data preparation. Mss. completion: 2016?

"Japan Remembered: Taiwanese and Chinese 'Memory' of Two Flood Control Projects." I will extend research for a related chapter in "Dam Japan" into a new work that focuses on ways in which Taiwan, the PRC and Japan have used images of pre-war projects for their own political purposes. Completion: 2017?

This *five-year, multi-million dollar project* focuses on understanding Japanese historical responses to climate change, their relationship to societal resilience and their possible value as models for modern society in its efforts to deal with climate changes. The project is comprised of more than 60 scholars, of whom I was the first (of only two, the other brought on board at my suggestion) non-Japanese scholar. My contributions to this project involve both work extending elements of my second book on joint landownership and its relationship to environmental risk, and my current project on Japanese responses to flood risk. In addition, my work for the project will include assisting Japanese historians to craft their work for contextualization and publication for international audiences, audiences considerably different from that of Japanese historical scholarship, which typically assumes a much narrower problem focus. Participation involves funding for multiple trips to Japan to participate in seminars and to support my own research (first trip, July-August, 2015).
