# **From Our Director**

In 2023-24, Mershon continued to integrate people and projects across our multidisciplinary, global engagements. We strengthened our active base of affiliates by organizing a variety of networkbuilding inhouse events, including round-robin Mershon Mondays and get-to-know-the-faculty lunches for grad students. We also worked to build complementarity across research, public programming, and training activities, with a growing emphasis on the latter.

Highlights of this approach were the November 2023 National Security Simulation and the year-long Measuring Peace series. Mershon has become the permanent institutional host of the biennial "Sim," which brings Ohio State students into active problem-solving with professionals including prominent Washington journalists; retired generals, ambassadors, and congresspeople; federal lawyers; active military members; and Central Ohio business leaders over two days of intensive role play. This year we commissioned observers to assess learning and reviewed the planning process. In consequence we are templating Sim delivery, developing course tie-ins to deepen student learning, instituting a scenario writing seminar, and deepening our dialogue with the Serious Games project at the University of Belgrade.

The "Measuring Peace" series highlighted Mershon's peacebuilding portfolio. It grew out of the previous year's Transitioning from Violence project (with a book now in press from the US Institute of Peace) and informed the design of the comparative post-agreement study launched in summer 2024 with Basque, Northern Ireland, and Colombian partners. Students participating in three sessions received a certificate. Students also benefited from the flourishing International History Workshop, the Quantum Social Science Bootcamp, the New Wave Realism conference, the Made By History partnership, the Mershon Africa Forum, and Mershon's new participation in the Department of State's Diplomacy Lab. The new Non-State Archive offers professional experience to PhD students while assisting global movements to catalogue and preserve their records.

Mershon's public programming engaged directly with current events. The Kruzel Lecture recruited Ivan Krastev to explain the relationship demographics and democracy in recent European politics. Three events on the Gaza war addressed both international contexts and US domestic reactions. Global Ethics Day brought the Carnegie Council Doorstep Podcast to interview Ohio State students and faculty.

We funded research: over a quarter million dollars for 22 faculty and grad student projects, including ongoing initiatives such as the Comparative National Elections Project, the Indus Basin Water Project, Legal Geopolitics of the Ocean, Centering the Global Periphery, and VIEW (the Violence, Ideology, and Extremism Working Group). Edited volumes from the latter two groups are currently in production. Postdocs Brooks Marmon, Zaynab Quadri, and Sefa Secen published books or got contracts for them, and moved on to new positions as we recruited our next cohort.

We are grateful to all the affiliates, staff, partners, donors, and audiences who create the work of Mershon.

### Our Mission Statement

The Mershon Center studies the human and social dimensions of complex security challenges. Through research and engagement, we reframe the big issues while creating new models for ground-level problem-solving. By inviting multiple perspectives into conversation, we gain visibility into the human and social dimensions of security problems at all levels and cultivate the skillset for achieving solutions. Our Global Impact The Mershon Center research, programs, and events engaged with scholars, thought leaders, policymakers, and government organizations across the globe. This year we cultivated collaborations with 66 educational institutions, 38 or 57% of which were international institutions representing 16 countries on five continents. We also worked with State agencies in Burundi, Colombia, Northern Ireland, and the United States.

## Our Campus Impact

Mershon convened faculty and students from fields involved analytically and/or practically with diplomacy, conflict, peacebuilding, governance, cooperative problemsolving, and related concerns. We fostered conversation with practitioners and policymakers.





## **Our Research**

The Mershon Center supported faculty and student research through grant and scholarship opportunities and offered post-doctoral and visiting scholar appointments. We were home to ongoing research initiatives with unique goals and perspectives on security.

In 2023-2024, the Mershon Center awarded more than a quarter million dollars to fund 22 new research projects as well as nearly \$20,000 for student scholarship opportunities.

### Our Events

As an interdisciplinary center, Mershon hosted events featuring renowned speakers from across campus and across the world. This past year, we presented 39 events ranging from the Quantum Social Science Bootcamp to a U.S. Department of Justice conference to a National Security Simulation. These events sparked conversations and garnered more than 1,777 attendees.

The focus of research was to explore and better understand the dynamic intersection of cultural identity, insecurity, and federalism as a source of current ethnic and caste related conflict.




#### Violence, Ideology, and Extremism Working Group (VIEW)
